





Dear Friends,

It's been a frigid winter in Delaware and like many of you, we're eager to shake off that winter dormancy and start gardening!

While cold winters can feel like a hassle, native plant seeds are naturally adapted to cold weather. Some species require cold, moist conditions to break down their seed coat and begin germinating—a process called cold stratification. For plants like Milkweed, which Monarchs rely on to complete their lifecycle, this process is essential.

This year at our Native Plant Sale, we will be offering several native species that are of special significance to Delaware's ecosystems. Look for those marked as species of conservation concern, which are rare plants identified in the Flora of Delaware database (DNREC). These plants are critical to protect as part of our state's commitment to preserving biodiversity.

For over three decades, Delaware Nature Society has been proud to support the use of native plants through our annual Native Plant Sale. But our mission goes far beyond the sale itself. From individual and community gardens to large nature preserves, native plants are vital to resilient, healthy ecosystems.

In our preserves and natural areas, we focus on controlling invasive, nonnative plants, which allows the regeneration of native species that are essential for wildlife. In urban settings, we are partnering with community gardens to support their specific needs that provide nourishment to both people and pollinators. One of our exciting projects, the Wilmington Pollinator Pathway and Food Resiliency Project, is developing an integrated network of gardens to support both pollinator and community food sources directly with those in greatest need.

Our efforts are shaped by years of experience in land management, regenerative farming, and fostering the connection between people and nature. We continue this important work thanks to supporters like you!

Join us by prioritizing native plants in your gardens. Together, we can ensure that our landscapes remain beautiful, diverse, and ecologically balanced.

Noteworthy Natives

According to DNREC, over a quarter of Delaware's native plants are considered rare and species of conservation concern due to factors including development, habitat loss, and climate change. Species of conservation concern are those species that are identified as rare in the state according to the Flora of Delaware Database (delflora.org/flora) and are a priority for protection. By including some of these plants in your native garden, you can help increase the biodiversity of your landscape and help build back habitat for local and migrating wildlife. Some of the species available at our Native Plant Sale are listed below.

Height: 15-20" Width: 18" P, C *White-tinge Sedge* Fine texture; grass-like tufts; excellent for dry shade, erosion.

Carex amphibola

Height: 8-12" Width: 8-12" P, C *Eastern Narrow-leaved Sedge* Compact; good for erosion control or floodplain; semi-evergreen.

Greenish April FS, PS, SH M, D

Carex pensylvanica

Height: 6-10" Width: 14-20"+ P, C Pennsylvania Sedge Fine-textured, spreading; for dry shade, slopes.

Carex radiata NEW

White Apr-Jul PS M

Height: 1-2' Width: 1-2' EC, PC Eastern Star Sedge Use as a groundcover or edging in shade or mass with wildflowers for a more natural look in your garden. \checkmark

White Apr-Jul PS, SH D,M

Carex rosea NEW

Height: 1' Width: 1-2' EC, EP *Rosy Sedge* Semi-evergreen tufted woodland sedge to add en masse to the garden or mixed with other wildflowers.

Caltha palustris

Height: 12-18" Width: 8-12" P, C Marsh Marigold Large, buttercup-like flowers; for wet soil or water's edge.

Juncus effusus

Aug-Sept FS, PS M, W

Height: 2-4' Width: 1-2' P, C *Lamp (Soft) Rush* Evergreen; interesting tubular form; for waterside or moist border.

Pink Sept-Nov FS, PS D, M Muhlenbergia capillaris

Height: 18-36" Width: 16-32" P, EC Hair-awn Muhly A stunning pink cloud; combine with meadow flowers.

Pinkish July-Sept FS M, W, D

Panicum virgatum 'Shenandoah'

Height: 3-4' Width: 3-4' C,EP Switchgrass Showy red fall foliage, tough plant. 🌱

Silver Aug-frost FS D

Schizachyrium scoparium 'Standing Ovation'

Height: 3-4' Width: 1' P, C Little Bluestem Tight, upright habit; bluish leaves turn orange to purple-brown, fall. \checkmark



Salmon-red May-frost FS, PS M Lonicera sempervirens 'Major Wheeler'

Height: 3-8' Width: 1-10' P, C *Trumpet Honeysuckle* Resists powdery mildew; many flowers; hummingbirds love it!

Lilac blue May-June FS, PS M, W Wisteria frutescens 'Amethyst Falls'

Height: 10-30' Width: 6-8' EP American Wisteria Cascading blooms; less aggressive than Asian species. $\sqrt{2}$

Athyrium filix-femina

Height: 24-30" Width: 24" P, C Lady Fern Lacy fronds provide beautiful backdrop for flowers spring to fall.

Dennstaedtia punctilobula

Height: 18-30" Width: 3-4' P, C Hay-scented Fern Groundcover; even takes dry sunny spots; lacy, bright green.

Dryopteris carthusiana

Height: 1-3' Width: P, C Spinulose Wood Fern Fronds yellow in fall; can be found in swamps.

Dryopteris goldiana

Height: 3-4' Width: 28-38" P, C Goldie's Wood Fern Tall, leathery, arching fronds abruptly tapering at the tip.

Height: 2-4' Width: 3-4' P, C Interrupted Fern Distinctive fronds; good cover for ground-nesting birds and wildlife.

Osmundastrum (Osmunda) cinnamomeum

Height: 2-5' Width: 2-4' P, C Cinnamon Fern Cinnamon-colored spikes; graceful.

PS, SH M

Polystichum acrostichoides

Height: 1-2' Width: 1-2' P, C Christmas Fern Leathery, evergreen; good for slopes; mix with delicate plants.

Actaea (Cimicifuga) racemosa

Height: 3-8' Width: 3-4' P, C Black Bugbane (Cohosh) Tall candles light up summer garden and feed small pollinators. $p \ge 2$

White Apr-May PS, SH M

Actaea pachypoda

Height: 18-30" Width: 12-16" P, EC White Baneberry (Doll's Eyes) Pretty but non-edible ivory fruits extend interest into late summer.

Yellow-green July-Sep FS, PS M, D Agastache nepetoides NEW

Height: 3-8' Width: 1-3' P,C Yellow Giant-hyssop Rare in Del.; long blooming; takes heat and humidity, resists deer.

Lilac pink July-Aug FS, PS D, M

Allium cernuum

Height: 8-24" Width: 8-12"+ EP Nodding Onion Cascading droplets of flowers; tuck in among other flowers, ferns.

White June-Oct FS, PS D

Anaphalis margaritacea NEW Height: 1-3' Width: 2.5" EC,EP Western Pearly Everlasting Larvae host for American Lady butterflies and food for Painted Lady butterflies. Commonly used in dried flower arrangements.

White June FS, PS, SH M, D

Anemone virginiana

Height: 1-3' Width: 12-16"+ P, C *Thimbleweed* Pretty late-spring blooms; neat seedheads; very adaptable.

White May FS, PS M, D Antennaria plantaginifolia

Height: 3-12" Width: 8-24" P,C *Woman's-tobacco (Pussytoes)* Larval host of American Lady butterfly; ground cover, rock garden. 💥

Greenish-purp May PS,SH M

Aplectrum hyemale Height: 10-24" Width: 8" P, EC

Puttyroot Stalks of tiny orchids; solitary, pleated leaf appears in fall.

Red/yellow Apr-May FS, PS M

Aquilegia canadensis Height: 2-3' Width: 8-12" P, C *Wild Columbine* Colorful, delicate early blooms draw early hummingbirds. ★

Green/purp Apr-May PS, SH M

Arisaema triphyllum

Height: 12-30" Width: 1' P, C Jack-in-the-pulpit Unusual hooded flower; set it off with ferns, woodland flowers. 🏷

Maroon April PS, SH M

Asarum canadense Height: 6-12" Width: 12-18"+ P, C *Wild Ginger* Bold; groundcover for banks or under trees and shrubs.

Mauve J

Mauve July-Aug FS, PS M, W

Asclepias incarnata Height: 2-5' Width: 2' P, C *Swamp Milkweed* Magnet for butterflies; good with Monarda, Eutrochium, grasses.

Pink June-July FS M, D

Asclepias syriaca

Height: 3-6' Width: 3' P, C Common Milkweed Fragrant flowers; monarch feeding station; decorative pods.



Orange June-Aug FS D

Asclepias tuberosa

Height: 1-2' Width: 1' P, C Butterfly Weed Large clusters of bright flowers draw many pollinators. 🖈 🔀

Creamy July-Sept FS D

Asclepias verticillata Height: 1-2' Width: 1' P, C Whorled Milkweed Scented flowers; fine-textured foliage; larval host for Monarchs.

Purple, Blue May-Aug PS, SH D Blephilia ciliata NEW

Height: 1-2' Width: 1-2' EC, PC Downy Wood Mint Unique stacked flowers provide early season pollinator support.

Yellow-green Apr-May PS, SH M

Caulophyllum thalictroides

Height: 1-2' Width: 1-2' P Blue Cohosh Deep blue summer fruit; attractive form and foliage. ៷ 🌱

White Apr-Aug FS D

Cerastium arvense NEW Height: 1.5' Width: 1-3' EC, EP

Field Chickweed Nice addition to your spring wildflower display. Spreads readily forming dense matted colonies. Cutting flower stems prevents self-seeding.

White May PS M

Chamaelirium luteum

Height: 8-30" Width: 6" P Fairy Wand Very rare; male and female flower stalks rise above basal rosettes.

Chelone glabra

Height: 2-4' Width: 2' P, C Turtlehead Snapdragon-like flowers; attracts butterflies; lovely with Conoclinium. $\frac{1}{2}$

Claytonia virginica

Height: 4-12" Width: 3"+ P, C *Virginia Spring-beauty* Star-like flowers form a very early carpet of woodland color.

SPRING CLEANING Native Plant Care

Keep your garden looking fresh through the seasons, benefiting wildlife and the environment.

- Weed, while also removing seedlings of undesirable plants, but do not leave empty spaces.
- Lightly mulch with leaf compost, if desired.
- Selectively prune shrubs over two years old.
- Assess your garden and determine if additional plants are needed to fill in any bare space that may promote weed growth.
- Divide & transplant perennials to fill in gaps/ expand gardens.
- Cut back dead flowers and grass stems once temperatures remain above 50°F to stubble of varying heights (8" to 22" tall) to provide nest cavities for native bees, whose larvae will develop over a year inside the stems and hatch the next growing season (new plant growth will hide the stubble).

Height: 2-3' Width: 3'+ C, EP *Mistflower (Wild Ageratum)* Butterflies love it; good cut flower; likes moist but happy in dry, too.

Yellow June-July FS D, M

Coreopsis verticillata

Height: 24-28" Width: 24-40" EP, EC Whorled Tickseed More airy habit than cultivars, so not prone to powdery mildew. \Pr

Violet Apr-May FS, PS M

Delphinium tricorne

Height: 8-18" Width: 8-12" EP *Dwarf Larkspur* Show-stopping color; summer dormant; plant with ferns, sedges.

Dicentra cucullaria

White April PS M

Height: 8" Width: 8" P Dutchman's-breeches Frosty blue-gray foliage over lightly fragrant flowers; summer dormant.

White or Pink Apr-May PS, SH M

Dodecatheon meadia

Height: 9-18" Width: 9" EP Shooting-star Delicate blossoms like those of cyclamen.

White Sept FS, PS M

Doellingeria (Aster) umbellata

Height: 3-7' Width: 3-4' P, C *Flat-topped White Aster* Towering blooms resemble the flowers of Joe-Pye Weed; a wonderful meadow plant.

Magenta July-Aug FS, PS M

Echinacea purpurea

Height: 2-3' Width: 18-24" EP Purple Coneflower Dangling petals; goldfinches, juncos, butterflies love it. $\frac{1}{20}$

Rose-purple June-Aug FS, PS M

Echinacea purpurea Pow Wow® Wild Berry Height: 16-20" Width: 12-16" EP *Purple Coneflower* Smashing raspberry-colored daisies on compact, bushy plants.

Rose June-Aug FS,PS D,M

Echinacea purpurea 'Primadonna Deep Rose'

Height: 2-3' Width: 1-2' X Purple Coneflower Stems of this cultivar are wide and sturdy. Adaptable and tolerant of drought, heat, humidity, and poor soils. Mass with Rudbeckias. \cong \checkmark

Deep pink July-Aug FS, PS D, M Echinacea purpurea 'Ruby Star' ('Rubinstern')

Height: 2-3' Width: 18-24" EP *Purple Coneflower* Known for its vibrant flowers.

White March-April PS M

Enemion biternatum Height: 6-8" Width: 6" EP False Pug-Anemone Beautiful in a

False Rue-Anemone Beautiful in a woodland garden; similar to Rue-Anemone.

White, Yellow, Lavender Apr-June PS,SH D,M Erigeron pulchellus 'Lynnhaven Carpet'

Height: 12-16" Width: 18-24" X *Robin's Plantain* Dense green-gray leaves and matforming habit creating a low-growing groundcover.

Pink July-Aug FS,PS M,W

Eupatorium fistulosum 'JoJo' NEW Height: 3-4' Width: 2' X

JoJo' Joe-Pye Weed A shorter, more compact stature and upright habit make this plant a great fit for managed landscapes. Combined with a longer, brighter, showier flower display, 'JoJo' is a visual knockout in the garden.

White July-Oct FS,PS M

Eupatorium rotundifolium NEW

Height: 1-3' Width: 1-2' EC, EP Roundleaf Thoroughwort Ideal for enhancing biodiveristy and providing wildlife habitat in your rain garden or native plant landscape. Resistant to black walnut.

White July-Sept FS, PS D

Euphorbia corollata

Height: 2-3' Width: 16-24" P, C *Flowering Spurge* Airy sprays of flowers like baby's breath; attracts beneficial insects.

Lavender Sept-Oct FS D, M

Eurybia (Aster) spectabilis Height: 1-2' Width: 1-2' C, EP *Showy Aster* Large, showy flowers; leaves burgundy in fall and winter; rare.

Lavender-rose Aug-Sept FS, PS M, W

Eutrochium (Eupatorium) dubium 'Baby Joe' Height: 2-3' Width: 15-18" P, C *Coastal Plain Joe-Pye Weed* For small spots or

containers; no flopping; tolerates a bit of shade. $\frac{1}{2}$

Deep mauve July-Aug FS, PS M, W

Eutrochium (Eupatorium) dubium 'Little Joe'

Mauve July-Oct FS, PS M

Eutrochium (Eupatorium) purpureum

Height: 5-7' Width: 2-4' P, C Sweet-scented Joe-Pye Weed Vanilla-scented flowers and leaves; superb for butterflies, bees. $\frac{1}{2}$

White Mar-Nov FS, PS D

Fragaria virginiana NEW

Height: 4" Width: 1' EC,EP Virginia Strawberry Low-growing wild strawberry producing an edible fruit with fall foliage turning shades of red. Larval host for Gray Hairstreak. 😤 🌂

Gentiana andrewsii

Height: 1-2' Width: 24-30" P, C *Closed Bottle Gentian* Richly colored, unusual blooms; thrives in cool, moist soil.

Rosy purple Apr-June FS, PS, SH D, M Geranium maculatum

Height: 1-2' Width: 1-2' P, C Wild Geranium Sweet, bowl-shaped blooms for borders or woodland edges.

Yellow Aug-Sept FS M Helenium autumnale

Height: 3-5' Width: 3' C, EP Common Sneezeweed Attracts butterflies; interesting domed heads and toothed petals. \sqrt{p}

Yellow, Purple Apr-Oct FS M,W

Helenium flexuosum

Height: 1-3' Width: 1-2' P,C Purple-headed Sneezeweed Tolerates temporary flooding. Attracts a variety of pollinators. Clump forming and showy flowers. $\Re \mathbf{P}$

Pale yellow July-Oct FS, PS M, D Helianthus divaricatus

Height: 4-6' Width: 2-3' P, C Woodland Sunflower A sunflower that takes dappled shade; becoming rare in Del. $\frac{1}{2}$

Gold July-Aug FS M

Heliopsis helianthoides

Height: 4-6' Width: 3-5' P, C Ox-eye Perennial sunflower attracts butterflies, birds, beneficial insects. $\sqrt{10} \approx \sqrt{5}$

Yellow-green May-June FS, PS M, D Heuchera americana

Height: 10-24" Width: 12-30" P, C *American Alumroot* Semi-evergreen leaves; fantastic foil for wildflowers.

White July-frost PS, SH D, M

Heuchera villosa (macrorhiza) 'Autumn Bride'

Height: 18-24" Width: 15-42" EP Hairy Alumroot Semi-evergreen, apple-green foliage and showy flowers; magnificent in shade.

White or Pink July-Sept FS, PS M, W

Hibiscus moscheutos

Height: 3-6' Width: 3' P, C Swamp Rose-mallow Gigantic flowers with pink centers; tropical look. $\sqrt[4]{P} \gtrsim \sqrt[5]{V}$



Blue May-June FS M, W

Iris versicolor

Height: 2-3' Width: 3' P, C Blue Flag Regal flower; good focal point, especially along water.

Orange, Yellow May-Aug PS, SH Dry, Moist Krigia biflora

Height: 1-2' Width: 1' P *Two-flower Cynthia* Attractive waxy, light green foliage; spreads over time through rhizomes; good for groundcover.

Reddish purple Aug-Sep FS, PS M, D

Liatris scariosa

Height: 1-4' Width: 12-18" P, EC Tall Gayfeather Fluffy button-like blooms; loves dry, sandy or rocky soil. $1 \longrightarrow 5 5$

Rosy purple July-Aug FS, PS M, W

Liatris spicata

Height: 2-4' Width: 12-18" P, C Spike Gayfeather (Dense Blazing Star) Blooms like exclamation points; use with grasses, Eutrochiums.

Rosy purple July-Aug FS, PS D

Liatris squarrosa

Height: 24-30" Width: 2' P Scaly Gayfeather Shiny foliage; large, spidery flowers; native to dry, open woods. $\frac{1}{2}$

Red or Orange July PS, SH M

Lilium superbum

Height: 3-8' Width: 1-2' P, C Turk's Cap Lily Spectacular candelabras of bellshaped flowers; bulb. $\sqrt[4]{P} \cong \checkmark$

Red July-Sept FS, PS M, W

Lobelia cardinalis

Height: 2-4' Width: 1' P, C Cardinal Flower Stunning; hummingbird favorite; long-blooming. $1 \rightarrow 23$

Blue Aug-Oct FS, PS M, W

Lobelia siphilitica Height: 3-4' Width: 12-16" P, C *Great Blue Lobelia* Butterflies love it; combine with red, gold or pink flowers for contrast.

Violet-blue Apr-July FS, PS D, M

Lupinus perennis

Height: 1-2' Width: 1-2' C, EP Wild Lupine Spires of deep violet; self-sows; best in sandy soil; delicate foliage. $\frac{1}{2}$

White May-June PS M

Maianthemum (Smilacina) racemosum

Height: 2' Width: 2' P, C False Solomon's-seal Billowy flowers, arching stems; pretty berries in fall. $\frac{1}{20}$

White May PS, SH M

Maianthemum stellatum

SUMMER LOVING Native Plant Care

Keep your garden looking fresh through the seasons, benefiting wildlife and the environment.

- Weed.
- Water (deeply) new plantings 1-2 times per week. Established plantings should not need water unless there is a prolonged drought in the first year of establishing the garden.
- Remove spent flowers as desired from aggressive re-seeders and continue into the fall.
- Around July 4th cut back wildflowers that bloom after mid-July, like asters, so they grow into a more compact form. Ideally cut 25% to 75%, depending on how tall you want the plants to be later in the season.
- Retain last year's dead stubble as native bee larvae are still developing in the stems.

- Weed as needed; weeds should diminish over time as the garden establishes.
- Leave spent vegetation standing and leaf litter in beds to provide shelter for birds, other small animals, and insects that may overwinter in leaves.
- Selectively prune shrubs over two years old.
- Leave seeds and fruits on native plants through the fall and into the winter as they are good food sources for birds and add visual interest for you throughout the winter.
- Remove seeds/fruits from plants with aggressive reseeding habits if they are taking over the garden.

Prepare to Succeed:

How to prepare your native garden space for optimal productivity and minimal maintenance.

Lawn to Landscape: How to prepare for a new native habitat.

As gardeners, we are eager to put plants in the ground when we embark on a new project. However, without proper preparation, we may be left frustrated with the amount of maintenance and slow progress that the garden may take to establish. The time invested in preparation leads to a highly productive space with less maintenance within the establishment period of 1-3 years.

When it comes to preparation, there is no "one size fits all" approach. Assessment of the site's current conditions is the first step.



Here are some scenarios to help you get started in your space.

A note on invasive species:

If your space currently has invasive species such as Japanese Stilt grass, it is best to spend the year smothering the space through solarization and other methods of eradication before you replant with native plants.

Helping Birds One Window at a Time

DelNature's spring Native Plant Sale coincides with the peak of spring migration, when hundreds of species of birds - amounting to millions of individuals - are either arriving in Delaware or flying overhead on their way north.

Last spring, 5.4 MILLION birds flew over Delaware during peak migration - two days after the Native Plant Sale weekend. Help DelNature protect birds, insects, and other wildlife during migration ... and all year round!

Most migrating birds fly at night and refuel during the day in gardens, parks, forests, and along beaches. These tired and hungry birds face many threats during migration, from predators to habitat loss, but there are several simple ways you can help both migrating *and* resident birds.

PLANT NATIVE wildflowers, shrubs, and trees, which provide more food than non-natives.

MAKE WINDOWS VISIBLE by using birdfriendly decals or other collision-prevention treatments such as tape or paint.

REDUCE LIGHT POLLUTION by turning off unnecessary lights at night or utilizing downward-facing lights. This helps the birds follow natural lights, such as the stars, and prevents disorientation in bright lights.


